Road to independence...journey to success QLD TRANSITION TO INDEPENDENCE MONTH

Tuesday, 1 November, is the launch of Queensland's *Transition to Independence Month* (T2I) raising awareness of the needs of young people transitioning from out-of-home care (i.e. foster, kinship or residential care) to independence on their journey towards achieving positive life outcomes. Queensland has the second highest out-of-home care population³ in the country and every year around 500 young people in QLD leave care.

The theme for 2016 is **"Road to independence...Journey to success"** highlighting that this time CAN be a positive experience when appropriate planning and supports are in place, including the Next Step After Care program.

While growing up in care, a young person can experience multiple placements in different types of care and a number can approach adulthood without the stable presence or influence of a positive, significant adult in their lives.

ABS data states that most 20-24-year old's live in their family home which is often in contrast to care leavers' circumstances. CREATE's research has shown that some 15-17-year old's (preparing to leave care) can be without adequate planning (64%)² or experience traumatic circumstances such as not having a place to live (35% experienced homelessness in the first year after leaving care)².

CREATE has heard from young people that they feel more secure and confident about facing the challenges of growing up when they have the support of their transition team. This team should be led by the young person and consist of people who the young person identifies as able to assist them in planning or through leaving care (it could include carers, Child Safety Officers and other supportive adults in the broader community).

The power of social media is being harnessed in this year's T2i month awareness campaign, inviting people who work with young people with a care experience to post a photo on social media with a caption about the young person's "best personal quality", along with the hashtag **#t2imonth** via Facebook, Twitter or Instagram.

Young people need to have a say regarding their aspirations, their dreams and their goals which set the path of their journey towards adulthood.
